Bicycles for Punmu

From the 17th to the 22nd of September 2014 two members of Track Care WA Incorporated, Graham Weber and I, delivered 40 BMX bikes plus spare wheels, spare tyres and tubes and helmets to the Punmu Primary School Community – Martu People of the Western Deserts. http://en.wikipedia.org/wiki/Martu_people.

All 40 BMX bikes were kindly donated by 'Bicycles for Humanity', with their volunteers and employees of Iluka Resources putting the bikes together and making them all operational. It was as if this project was meant to happen. From the formation of the original proposal through to the fluke contact with 'Bicycles for Humanity' by our Grants Officer, Kerry Bessen. Throughout the planning stages all the round pegs fell comfortably into the round holes, so to speak.

The bikes were loaded onto the Track Care trailer a week before leaving. Because they were stacked so high on the trailer, I could not secure them all at my place, so another very good mate John DuPont came to the rescue.

After collecting the trailer and bikes, the first leg was a fairly casual drive up to Cue enjoying the usual stop at the Bindoon Bakery that many Track Care volunteers know so well. Staying overnight at a bed and breakfast enabled us to get an early start in the morning and push through to sunset, managing to get within 70km of Marble Bar, find a patch of dirt and swag it for the night.

Next morning, after a hearty bush breakfast we packed up and headed into Marble Bar to refuel and take a bath at Chinaman's Pool before heading out on the Ripon Hills Road for the Oakover River causeway for lunch. The initial plan was to camp out another night before heading into Punmu Community Saturday morning but we were

making good progress over some pretty horrendous corrugations past Telfer Mine. Deflating our tyres to the conditions certainly paid dividends in terms of comfort levels and dealing with the ever relentless fatigue. Closer to Punmu the road was being graded which enabled us to drive into Punmu Friday afternoon, meet up with the Primary school teachers (Jo and Josh), unload the BMX bikes at the Primary School, as well as set up camp outside the Community at the ranger's camp and cook a late dinner. That evening we were visited by a very cunning and annoying little Dingo, named Fart by the Rangers, intent on cleaning up our scraps from dinner. In the morning we were fortunate to have a chat with the rangers before Jo and Josh arrived to work out a plan for the day. Being that the AFL footy semi-finals were on that day and the daily temperature was spiking to about 40°C - we took Jo and Josh's offer to pack up and head to their place in

Community for some air conditioned comfort and spend the next evening there, which enabled us to make an early start Sunday morning for the trip home.

Saturday afternoon Graham and I were treated to a very special event when we were invited to accompany the students on a hunting expedition for goanna a few km east of Community. Jo and some of the students prepared all veges for the camp oven. Unfortunately no goanna ended up in the pot so it was an all vegetarian meal that evening. Many thanks to Deborah who supervised and did most of the camp oven cooking. Very tasty indeed - even without the goanna. The students tried real hard to chase down a goanna too, like mountain goats, bare feet all over a hill with alarmingly sharp rocks. On the way back to Community, Graham and I were treated to (apparently) a very rare occasion, with the students all singing together in the back of their Troopie over the UHF radio, and they were really good too. Graham and I cannot thank the Punmu Community enough for the generous hospitality shown toward us during our very short stay. It was much appreciated.

However, we were on a tight schedule to get Graham back to Perth. We said our farewells to everyone early Sunday morning and headed out at 6.30am, back onto that horrible corrugated road. With an empty trailer I decided to show Graham Carawine Gorge and then enter the Upper and Lower Carawine, take a swim during lunch in the Oakover River then head to Nullagine

via the Skull Springs Road. Graham did a detour to Running Waters while I continued on- too hard to turn the trailer around in there. Graham did eventually catch up to me.

Pushing down to Capricorn Roadhouse into a fairly stiff head wind and alarmingly horrible fuel economy, we bunked down for the night in a couple of their new Dongas enabling us to make an early start the next morning to take advantage of a tail wind. Overnight the wind changed direction and we were faced with another head wind, this time the worst since we left home 5 days earlier – just bad luck I guess.

Hopefully the primary school students will now have a real positive reason to come to school.
