Chairman's Report

While drafting this Introduction I have been again struck by the enormous effort and project success achieved by our members since the last newsletter. A number of these achievements are recounted in the following pages. Thank you everyone.

Other good work that has been underway includes the Wandoo National Park adoption project, which is progressing well. Together, the Motor Trade Association of Western Australia (MTA), the Department of Parks and Wildlife (DPaW) and Track Care WA Inc. (TCWA), with significant input from Tony Roupheal and Jean and Fred Hort, have identified two priority Conservation Wetland areas that need work to reduce off road vehicle damage. A third sensitive area has already had an abandoned caravan removed and the surrounding area given a targeted clean-up. This clean-up effort was undertaken by Ashley Jolley (Perth 4x4) and his volunteer team with the assistance / guidance of Doug Giles (DPaW). It is expected that the first proposed wetland project will have the on-ground works completed with a working bee event before Christmas 2015. Depending on seasonal conditions, the second project is planned to be completed by another working bee event on a suitable weekend in March / April 2016.

The Shire of Halls Creek's staff are currently preparing the documentation required to enable a draft MOU (with TCWA) to be presented to their Council for endorsement and approval. It is anticipated the MOU will be placed on the agenda of the first meeting following the October 2015 Local Government elections. This will further formalise our relationship with the Shire, which incorporates the northern end of the Canning Stock Route.

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Well 12 refurbished

One of the most iconic 4wd tracks in Australia today has to be the Canning Stock Route. Knowing that Angela and I have limited time in WA, it's always been on my 'must do' list, so when Track Care WA announced that they were going to rebuild Well 12, we were IN!

I had no idea what the track conditions would be like, but Track Care gave us a vehicle preparation sheet which basically required the entire car be checked and rebuilt as required. Possibly irresponsible, but no time for that as I had been in Darwin for the three weeks prior, therefore I threw in a small tool box and a couple of spare bits and bobs, checked the oil and we were off.

We met most of the crew at Bindoon bakery (as you do) and then made our way north. Most of the vehicles were towing trailers with the new sleepers and various maintenance equipment, along with Shane towing Terex the mighty digger. Our first night was spent just north east of Paynes Find at Camel Camp beside the Rabbit Proof Fence. On to Sandstone with a small tourist detour to check out London Bridge and the old underground brewery. Another experience not to be missed, is enjoying one of Lady Di's Pies, set up in the main street under a pergola. Not only is she a true blue Aussie character but her pies are pretty special also.

On arriving at Wiluna we discover that all dirt roads are closed, therefore we weren't able to access the CSR the next day as planned. Our rest day allowed us to have a look around Wiluna and we helped the elderly owners of Gunbarrel Lager by picking mandarins and installing a new washing machine.



As trailers aren't allowed between Well 1 and 5, we entered the CSR at Well 9 via Glen Ayle station. Let the fun begin. Some of the track was still very wet and slippery with some major washouts. In addition some of the dry areas had very deep corrugations. Terex's trailer was very low and reduced the speed of the convoy, but still very much worth it.

On arrival at Well 12, Michael went to inspect it and almost fell through the top due to termite damage. The next couple of days had the team remove the windlass, remove the termite damaged sleepers and replace them with new age composite plastic ones. The windlass was re-positioned and the area cleaned up. The camp area was cleaned up and the previously installed Track Care toilet was serviced. Departing south we performed minor maintenance at Wells 9, 6 and 4. We overnighed at Well 6, previously rebuilt by Geraldton 4WD Club - what an awesome campsite. We departed the

CSR at Well 5 heading into the Carnarvon Range. This was another bonus as the traditional owners have closed off this range to the general public but they had given us permission to enter. The range is truly amazing with lots of stunning scenery.

A very long day winding our way back to the Great Northern Highway via Ned's Creek station. Angela and I departed the south bound convoy and headed west to Gabyon Station for an enjoyable couple of days. Accommodation is basic (old shearer's quarters) which adds to the charm of staying there. If you want hot water for a shower, no problem, just fire up the wood heater etc. Angela enjoyed feeding the orphan lambs and kangaroo and we very much recommend staying at Gabyon.

Angela and I thoroughly enjoyed the time we spent with Track Care. Not only have we had a taste of the CSR but

hopefully we've left behind a legacy that will be enjoyed by fellow travellers for many years to come. If you get the opportunity to be involved in something similar I fully recommend you jump in boots and all.

Campsite for Mungkulu – August 2015

The Mungkulu camp site project commenced on the 15th August, with a convoy, once fully assembled, of 21 vehicles making the epic four day journey from Wiluna to the Mungkulu Clay pan in the Gibson Desert carrying almost 4 tonnes of gear.



Along the way traditional owner for the area Geoffrey Stewart immersed us all in his stories and knowledge of country, a rare and privileged opportunity to hear from a man who walked this country as a young man in his 'bujiman' days. Rita Cutter and Georgina Brown both walked the country as young kids with their families and shared their story and deep knowledge of bush tucker with the group.

Construction commenced on the morning of the 22nd August after a team/site safety induction meeting held by trip leader Eric. It was a real ant nest operation with many eager hands at work. Thankfully the site selected was not rock based so digging of footings was easier.

After 2 days a "lay day" was called, with the traditional owners taking any who wanted on a tour of the Mungkulu Gorge, complete with dream time stories and Hamish's stick description of the Aboriginal occupation of the Australian continent. Georgina Brown also took us to the water hole where she and her family were introduced into western civilisation in the 70's. It was quite an emotional experience for both Georgina and the group and brought a lot of meaning and significance to the area and our operation.

Construction recommenced the next day and the structures were all but finished when operations were interrupted by a medical emergency that required our first ever RFDS evacuation from a TCWA project. Having the RFDS medical chest on site paid off big time. Two TCWA vehicles transported the patient to Cotton Creek via the "closed" Calvert Range being a 2 day return journey. I am pleased to report that the patient survived the vehicle journey and the RFDS evacuation flight and is recovering.

With the others having already left, the TCWA team packed and departed for the Warri

site and Veevers Meteorite Crater just off the Gary Highway. We continued onwards to Kunawarritji and "K Mart" for fuel and supplies, overnighing at Well 33. The group at this point broke into several smaller parties making their way home through either Newman, Rudall River or Carawine Gorge. It was a lengthy operation/project (the trip leader completing 5351kms) filled with many challenges or events, but none the less a very rewarding one. Thanks to all who participated throughout the process because without you all and your involvement, support and co-operation, it would not have happened. The trip for various reasons was hard on parts of our equipment and vehicles.

There was some trailer spring damage as well as a "few" tyre problems. Final tally being 17 vehicle punctures, 1 side wall split to a trailer tyre and 6 trailer tyre punctures. All punctures were successfully "plugged".
